



Exploring How Texts Work New edition


This 30th anniversary edition of a PETAA classic investigates how texts work to achieve their purposes. We venture beyond the surface, into the structure and language features of different genres, and explore how they make meaning. Our quest is to find useful ways of talking about language in the classroom and to use this common understanding to compose effective texts.

Exploring How Texts Work made a substantial impact on literacy teaching when it was first published in 1990, and it remains a relevant and practical teaching resource today. This is a book for new teachers who want to develop their own learning around language and text, as well as experienced teachers who might benefit from reflecting on the sources of their professional practice.

Exploring How Texts Work arose out of a research project involving primary teachers in the Wollongong area in New South Wales. Known fondly among educators as 'the pink book', this new edition marks its 11th reprint. Other classic texts by Professor Beverly Derewianka include *A new grammar companion for teachers* (her 'green book') and *Teaching language in context* (co-authored with Pauline Jones).

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This second edition of *Exploring How Texts Work* includes a new preface by Professor Beverly Derewianka and foreword by Associate Professor Pauline Jones, as well as freshly updated sample units of work.

Beverly Derewianka is Emeritus Professor of language education at the University of Wollongong and a leading figure in educational linguistics. She has authored 11 books, as well as numerous book chapters and journal articles. Her research projects have had a substantial impact on curriculum and syllabus development in Australia and internationally.

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
